DANCEEAST CENTRE FOR ADVANCED TRAINING

Welcome to the DanceEast Centre for Advanced Training, known as the CAT for short.

We provide high-quality dance training for young people aged 10-18 years. Based at the Jerwood DanceHouse on Ipswich's Waterfront, our young dancers come from across the East of England, attending classes in Ipswich, Norwich, and Cambridge. During their weekly training, CAT students will have classes in contemporary, ballet, hip hop, creative, and health.

Our CAT students work with a variety of people, including professional dance artists and choreographers from a diverse range of backgrounds and experiences.

We encourage everyone to apply to join the programme, regardless of their previous dance experience. We are looking for young people with exceptional talent, potential, enthusiasm, motivation, and commitment. We also look for people with strong physical awareness and creativity, with the ability to work both as a team and independently. To apply to join from September 2024, applicants will need to be aged 10-16 on 1 September 2024.

The DanceEast CAT is part of a national network supported by the Department for Education's Music and Dance Scheme. The National Centres for Advanced Training in Dance offers the highest quality dance training to young people across England. Find out more about the National CAT on page 12.



WE TRAIN

The DanceEast CAT is a non-residential, prevocational dance programme for those who are ready to make a commitment to training in dance. During their time on the CAT, students are prepared for professional dance training.

Our students attend approximately eight hours of dance each week, across three days. This is typically made up of two evening classes, in Ipswich, Norwich, or Cambridge, and one day at the Jerwood DanceHouse in Ipswich at the weekend. During these weekly sessions, students will have classes in contemporary, ballet, hip hop, creative, and health. All our technique classes are accompanied by musicians.


Weekly class timetables, which include the sessions and days you need to attend, are allocated at the start of the academic year in September. An example of a weekly timetable can be found on page 15.

As well as the weekly classes, we offer additional enrichment activities and additional support which includes:

- Access to physical health support
- Audition support and preparation
- Performances
- Theatre trips
- Spring and Summer Intensives
- Projects and workshops

Our curriculum gives students a strong grounding in technical and creative skills, as well as an introduction to the wider dance profession.





STUDENT SUPPORT

All students receive an Individual Training Plan (ITP) which aids their development and highlights personal goals and needs. ITPs are created in consultation with parents/carers and our CAT Tutors to monitor and support the student's learning. This ensures that every effort is made to encourage a healthy balance between academic work, dance training, and personal life.

COSTS AND FUNDING

The DanceEast CAT is supported through the Department for Education's Music and Dance grant scheme, which aims to reduce financial barriers to access the CAT. Means-tested grants are available to support the cost of the programme, meaning that anyone can apply to join the programme, regardless of their financial circumstances.

The grants support the overall costs of the programme, including training, classes, dancewear, trips, guests, performances, and a lot more.

AMOUNT OF GRANT (2023/24)

The fee per student for the academic year 2023/24 is £4,032. This is set nationally by the

Department for Education. Fees for 2024/25 will be confirmed in 2024.

To qualify for a national grant, the applicant must have been resident in the British Islands for three years, be a member of the European Economic Area or Switzerland, or be a refugee or the child of a refugee (conditions apply).

The DanceEast Bursary Fund may also be available for additional funding to support families who are required to make contributions towards course fees.

Parental contributions can be paid in three termly instalments, or over ten months by a monthly standing order.



TRAVEL AND DANCEWEAR

Grant holders receive financial assistance with travel and dancewear costs. Financial support is means-tested on the same scale as the grant-funding, for example, families who are entitled to a full grant are also entitled to full reimbursement for dancewear and travel costs; families who are entitled to 50% grant are entitled to claim 50% of these costs.

The nationwide programme aims to develop, create, and inspire the next generation of dance artists, choreographers, and leaders. The CATs provide highly specialised training to prepare young people for vocational and higher education programmes.





The CATs are supported by the Department for Education's Music and Dance Scheme. The CATs operate from host organisations that have been recognised for their excellence in arts and vocational training.

A WEEK IN THE LIFE OF A CAT STUDENT ESIMPLE ES

(AGED 17)

ESME'S WEEKLY JOURNAL

As a DanceEast CAT student, I train several times over the week with a great range of tutors.

WEDNESDAY

My CAT week starts on a Wednesday doing midweek Contemporary with Katie. I leave school at 5pm to get to Impington Village College and class starts at 6.45pm. Every class we begin with a warmup: either group activity or individual improvisation. This is always a great way to start because I can switch off from school and my creativity is engaged. Our classes progress in difficulty every week – developing from simple to more complex



combinations - which helps us learn new skills continually. In our lesson today I learnt a few new variations of handstands. I've never been comfortable trying new tricks, but we've been working on it for a couple of lessons now, so it was easy to give it a go.

THURSDAY

On Thursday evenings I go to ballet classes in Comberton Village Hall. I enjoy having this class because I get to dance with a different group of people. I have different tutors in my midweek vs weekend session which provides me with lots of unique feedback. It is also good when I am struggling with a particular element because I am provided with lots of advice which, when I combine, helps me grow.

SUNDAY

Sunday is my big CAT day. I wake up at 7am, to begin the drive to Ipswich at 8am. I dance in Violet Group so check that schedule for the day when I sign into the building and then head to the studios. Classes begin at 10.15 and each day consists of five sessions. Our

Contemporary and Ballet classes are each 1 hour 15 minutes. I always prefer to have this session in the morning because it is the best way to switch on for the rest of the day.

Then during lunch all the groups can mix and chat about the day. Our tutors are always around in this break, so we often have chats about how it's going, or even a personal 1-2-1 to discuss future plans and personal goals. I'm graduating this year so have already used lunch time to talk to the CAT team about what I think my higher education will look like.

The next three sessions are all 1 hour long: Hip Hop, Health, and Creative. Hip Hop is relatively

new, but I have already learnt so much in the last year. We have explored popping, house, and breaking styles – it's so different from the classical ballet training I am used to but always gets us in a good mood (great after lunch when you're tired and need some motivating). My favourite Sunday session is always Health. I really enjoy the variety of activities we can be doing each week – Yoga, Pilates, education about health, nutrition, strength training – I am able to learn so much about how to better myself as a dancer, in ways other than just dancing. Creative is a great way to practice our choreography, partner work skills, and generally try new things in a safe space.

Our day is complete at 5pm, when I then walk to the train station with other students before heading home.



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We want to give prospective students an insight into what it is like to be part of the DanceEast CAT, so we host a range of free events including Taster Days, Open Days, and Information Talks.

All our events are designed so that everyone can take part, regardless of their previous dance experience. These events are a great way to meet the CAT team, experience the training, and learn more about the programme.



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TASTER DAYS COME AND DANCE

Our Taster Days are free to attend and give you the chance to take part in dance workshops, led by our fantastic CAT tutors. Whilst you are dancing, your parents/carers have the chance to speak to the team and listen to a presentation where they will find out more about the programme.

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FAQs

HOW OLD DO I HAVE TO BE TO APPLY?

We are recruiting young people aged 10-16 years on 1 September 2024.

DOES IT MATTER IF I HAVEN'T HAD A LOT OF EXPERIENCE IN DANCE?

We are looking for young people who enjoy moving! You might never have taken part in a dance class before, have a small amount of experience, or have been dancing your whole life – we are looking for potential, dedication, and enthusiasm, so anyone can apply, regardless of experience. We also look for physical coordination, awareness, strength, uniqueness, enthusiasm, and commitment.

HOW OFTEN WILL I ATTEND

You will need to attend classes one full day at the weekend and two evenings during the week. In addition to this, there will be dance intensives during the Spring and Summer holidays.

WHERE DO WEEKLY CLASSES TAKE PLACE?

Weekend classes take place at the Jerwood DanceHouse in Ipswich. Midweek classes take place in Ipswich, Cambridge, and Norwich.

WILL IT AFFECT MY SCHOOL WORK?

The DanceEast CAT is designed to fit around schoolwork. Each student has an Individual Training Plan (ITP) which helps us work with the students to manage the demands of the training programme alongside their school commitments.

WHAT ABOUT OTHER DANCE CLASSES I ALREADY ATTEND?

You are able to continue with an external ballet class if it directly clashes with the DanceEast's CATs ballet class on a Thursday evening. The CAT will cover the cost of the class, and it will become part of your weekly training schedule.

WHAT IS COVERED BY THE COST OF THE COURSE?

The cost of the course, which may be covered by a means-tested grant, covers all classes, dancewear, trips, health support, performance opportunities, costumes, and a lot more. Students also have the opportunity to take part in projects with the National Centres for Advanced Training in Dance.

WHAT WILL I HAVE TO DO AT THE AUDITION?

For the first stage audition you will be placed in a group with people of a similar age and level of experience. The audition includes a mix of creative work and technique. Following stage one auditions, you may be invited to a stage two audition.

DOES THE PROGRAMME ONLY LAST FOR A YEAR?

Students can stay on the DanceEast CAT until they leave full-time education, usually aged 18 years, or up to the age of 24 if d/Deaf or disabled.

WHO TEACHES FOR YOU?

The quality of teaching is paramount to the success of the programme. Our teaching team is made up of teachers, artists, and choreographers of the highest calibre. Our students also have the opportunity to work with guest artists, which provides a greater insight into the wider dance profession. All technique classes are accompanied by musicians.

DO YOU SUPPORT STUDENTS WITH A DISABILITY AND ADDITIONAL NEEDS?

We welcome applications from all young people, including those with disabilities and additional needs. If you have any access or additional needs, please contact us so that we can find out how best to support you. Young people with disabilities may be able to remain on the CAT beyond the age of 18 years, usually up to the age of 24 if d/Deaf or disabled.

If you would like to join the DanceEast CAT, you will need to attend an audition. The auditions are designed to be accessible and fun for everyone. There are Audition Support



Workshops available to help guide you through the process and answer any questions you may have.

There is a two-stage audition process for September 2024 entry. All eligible young people aged 10-16 years on 1 September 2024 will be invited to a stage one audition. The stage one auditions include creative and technique workshops and have been designed to be accessible and fun, regardless of your previous experience. You may then be invited to a stage two audition.

We encourage everyone who is interested in joining the CAT to apply to audition. You do not need to have previous dance experience; we look for potential.


